Subject: Garden Waste Collections

Recommendation for the Decision:

To approve changing the garden waste collection term to run from the beginning of February until the end of November and to approve a fee of £37 per bin for 2024.

The reason for the need for a Decision:

See below

Rationale and justification for reaching the Decision:

Garden waste collection is one of the services offered by the Waste and Recycling Service, Environment Department. Since 2016, Gwynedd residents have had to pay a fee for the collection of these bins, and around 16,500 homes per year buy the service.

It is a service provided for 12 months of the year and brown bins are collected every fortnight. The Council recycles the waste collected, and this % contributes to the national recycling target.

Because of the way the service is implemented, the vehicles have to travel to every property that pays for collection. Often during the winter months these vehicles make empty journeys because residents do not present their bins. This is clearly a waste of resources in terms of employment costs and running costs of vehicles. We would not only spend our money more prudently, but we will also reduce our carbon emissions by not travelling purposeless trips.

For the 2024 term, we have reviewed the volume of tonnage collected each month and have made the decision to reduce the collections from 12 months to 10 months, but continue to collect every fortnight. Clearly the volume collected is seasonal, and in a year the Council collects about 6,700 tonnes of garden waste from our residents. We have analysed that only around 7% of this that is collected during the months of December and January (see graph).



Therefore, for this year, we will pilot collecting garden waste from 1 February until 30 November. It is acknowledged that this will create a difficulty for some of our residents, but it is possible to continue being able to recycle garden waste by using one of our eight recycling centres in Gwynedd. We are moving towards a seasonal pattern that is favoured by many other authorities in Wales by now.

The fee has increased with inflation since 2016, but because we are intending on reducing the collection period this year, it is recommended to keep the fee the same as last year at **£37 per bin**. It is felt that this fee is fair for the service; it works out to be about £1.70 per collection, and is comparable to other authorities in Wales.

The financial 'gap' of not increasing the fee with inflation will be addressed in the savings made by not collecting (travelling, etc.) and garden waste disposal fees.
