# CLODDIAU

#### Action Plan Scope:

This Action Plan covers cloddiau, a type of boundary particularly characteristic of the Llŷn Peninsula. Cloddiau are raised earth banks, usually stone faced, with possibly a hedge planted on top. They are unusual in the orientation of stones within the stone facing, which are usually placed with their longest side running vertically. They are therefore of significant local importance and ecological value, and frequently support a range of bankside and hedgerow flora, invertebrates, amphibians, reptiles and small mammals. In some cases cloddiau may incorporate the UK BAP priority habitat Ancient and / or species rich hedgerows<sup>1</sup>.

#### 1.2 Status in Wales and beyond

Cloddiau are found in Pembrokeshire, N.W. Wales, Anglesey and the Cambrian Coast.

# 1.3 Status in Gwynedd<sup>b</sup>

Cloddiau are particularly characteristic of the Llŷn Peninsula.

# 2. FACTORS AFFECTING THIS HABITAT IN GWYNEDD

- Lack of appropriate maintenance / management e.g. severe trimming / cutting of vegetation, and / or cutting at the wrong time of year, especially during the nesting period.
- Complete removal to create bigger fields suited to increased stock numbers or to accommodate large farm machinery.
- Boundaries such as cloddiau and dry stone walls, even those which have a hedge planted on top, are not necessarily protected by the Hedgerow Regulations 1997 in the same way as hedgerows, making them vulnerable to removal.
- Loss of traditional skills to maintain the clawdd such as periodic laying of the hedge and using an infill e.g. turf or soil, in between the stones.
- Damage by increased livestock numbers through grazing and erosion of their earth banks.

Bats, Lesser horseshoe bat, Barn owl, Chough, Farmland birds, Adder, Newts, Bluebell


# 4. CURRENT ACTION IN GWYNEDD

#### 4.1 Site and habitat protection

The Hedgerow Regulations 1997 may afford some protection to prevent hedgerow removal.

## 4.2 Management and programmes of action

- Agri-environment schemes such as the Llŷn Environmentally Sensitive Area (ESA) in conjunction with the Hedgerow Renovation Scheme, Tir Cymen and now Tir Gofal, have helped to encourage favourable management and enhancement of existing cloddiau and establish new cloddiau in Gwynedd.
- Gwynedd Council, Countryside Council for Wales and the Snowdonia National Park have produced a leaflet on the appropriate management of roadside verges, and a leaflet is pending on management of hedgerows, which will include cloddiau.



- Some sites have already been identified as potential Wildlife Sites.
- Specifications on the construction of cloddiau have been produced by Gwynedd Council and are available to their Highways Department.

- 1. To maintain existing species-rich cloddiau in Gwynedd and secure appropriate long term management.
- 2. To set "best practice" for managing our roadside cloddiau appropriately.
