# Our Area 2035 Results of the Public Engagement Exercise (February – June 2022)

## 1 Introduction


- 1.1 The aim of the Our Area 2035 Project is to hold a discussion with local communities in order to identify what is important to residents and how they would like to see their area develop over the next 10 15 years.
- 1.2 Our aim is to work together and develop solutions with organisations, groups and individuals. At the end of the project 13 specialised regeneration plans will be created to reflect the priorities and aspirations of local communities.
- 1.3 The first step to the project involved holding conversations with Councillors, Community and Town Councils and local regeneration groups in order to establish:
  - What is good about the area?
  - What is not so good about the area?
  - What changes would you like to see happen in the area in the next 15 years, that would make the area a better place to live?
- 1.4 **8** Community/Town Councils, organisations, groups and local Members in the Caernarfon Area presented their ideas regarding what should be the local priorities for the area in the period up to 2035. These responses were used as a basis for the second stage of wider public engagement.
- 1.5 In February 2022 a public engagement exercise was launched for each of the 13 areas, with local people being invited to contribute to the shaping of the Our Area 2035 project by filling in a simple survey online or on paper.
- 1.6 In order to encourage as many people as possible to participate, a comprehensive engagement campaign was organised, which included:
  - Press releases and a radio item;
  - Advertisements in the local papers;
  - Information leaflets;
  - Messages and videos through social media;
  - Prominent messages on the Cyngor Gwynedd website home page;
  - Attending the North Wales Pride event in Bangor.

- 1.7 In addition, a series of visits and face to face meetings were organised to hear the voices of groups and individuals that are seldom heard. These included:
  - GISDA Blaenau Ffestiniog A discussion session with members of the Young People Board and a session with members of the GISDA LGBT+ Club.
  - GISDA Caernarfon A discussion session with members of the GISDA LGBT+ Club.
  - GISDA Pwllheli A discussion session with members of the GISDA LGBT+ Club.
  - Dementia Actif Gwynedd, Barmouth A discussion session after the physical exercises.
  - Dementia Actif Gwynedd, Dolgellau A discussion session after the physical exercises.
  - Dementia Actif, Nefyn A discussion session after playing Boccia at Tafarn yr Heliwr.
  - Dementia Actif, Caernarfon A discussion session after the physical exercises.

# 2 County Overview


- **3,776** individuals across Gwynedd took the opportunity to have their say:
- 3,675 of these completed the online survey.
- 10 completed the paper survey that was available in libraries, 'Siop Gwynedd' or by phone request.
- 6 completed the 'Easy read' version of the survey.
- 85 people attended face to face sessions for young people, young people in the LGBT+ community, older people and people living with dementia.




## 2.2 Overview of the Respondents to the Public Survey for Gwynedd




























## 3.1 Overview of the Respondents to the Public Survey for the Caernarfon Area


3.2 The Our Area 2035 survey for the Caernarfon Area received **382** responses.












6.2 In response to the question 'Note anything else that is <u>not so good</u> about the Caernarfon Area that isn't mentioned above', 146 additional comments were received from the residents of the area. A number of these additional responses offered further comments about the themes above e.g. Litter, untidiness and the general look of the area is a problem, with a strong emphasis on the dog fowling issue (n=33); Anti-social behaviour and drug and alcohol misuse is an issue in the area (n=10); Problems relating to parking, road conditions and traffic in many parts of the area (n=9); More support and investment is needed to regenerate Caernarfon town centre (n=9); Arrangements for pedestrians and vehicles on the Maes (n=7).

Of the comments that indicated something else that is not so good about the area, the most popular themes were:

A number of these additional responses offered further comments about the themes above e.g. Plans to improve the appearance of the area - tidying up, more bins, wildflowers etc including tackling the issue of dog fouling (n=8); A greener area – more renewable energy schemes, reducing plastic use, setting up car charging points, tree planting schemes etc (n=5); Plans to create high value work and jobs in the area (n=5); Plans to ensure suitable housing to meet the needs of local people (n=4); Better provision within the health and well-being sector in the area as well as the development of a community hub to signpost individuals to suitable services (n=4).

## 8 Next steps

- 8.1 During the autumn, all the feedback we have received from the residents and organisations of the Caernarfon Catchment area will be considered during workshops with local organisation as part of work to develop Local Action Plans.
- 8.2 The Action Plan will seek to incorporate the projects and activities of a wider range of organisations that contribute to the improvement and regeneration of the Caernarfon Catchment area.
- 8.3 As part of the Regeneration Framework, arrangements will be set in place to monitor and co-ordinate the implementation of the Action Plan, taking into account existing working arrangements and partnerships.
- 8.4 The timetable for the next steps are:
- Workshops with Local organisations : October / November 2022
- Draft Action Plans prepared : March 2023
- Comments and additions received to the draft document: April 2023
- Revised Action Plans prepared : April / May 2023
- Monitoring and co-ordination arrangements in place: May 2023

Comments received during the face-to-face session with the Dementia Actif Gwynedd group in Arfon Leisure Centre, Caernarfon (07/07/22).

### What's good about the Caernarfon Area?

- Good walking routes.
- Frequent buses going to many places.
- Art lessons for the elderly.
- Byw'n lach.
- Good community and neighbours.
- Great activities in the Gallery, as well as good films in the cinema.
- The Welsh language everyone speaks Welsh in the streets and in the shops.

#### What's not so good about the Caernarfon Area?

- The high street has deteriorated.
- Not much for young children to do.
- Fewer Shops.
- The appearance of the area in general e.g. rubbish, grass growing.
- The Bontnewydd path to the train station is messy.
- Not many work opportunities in the area.
- Local people having to pay to enter the Castle didn't have to in the past.
- Not fond of the location of the buses.
- Fountain gone from the Maes.
- Slates can be slippery on the Maes.
- Signs for Cei Llechi not clear enough.
- House prices are high.

What changes would you like to see happen in the area that would make it a better place to live?

#### What's good about the Caernarfon Area?

- Friendly Community.
- Nice walking and cycling routes.
- Good skate park.
- Good places to go for food.
- Youth/social clubs.
- Clean air.
- · A good creative community 'Life in full colour.'
- Castle and heritage.
- Welsh language is spoken naturally in the area.
- Opportunities to volunteer have had good experiences in the Gallery, charity shops and cafes.
- Various jobs, especially creative ones.
- Caernarfon food festival.
- Regular market.
- Good pubs.

#### What's not so good about the Caernarfon Area?

- Stigma around young people.
- Hate crimes and matters regarding bullying.
- Perceptions about the work of the police.
- Inadequate / unreliable transport links and other bus issues.
- Drugs are used openly in the area.
- Accommodation and support no safe options.
- Lack of financial support in terms of further education and for young people in general.
- Poverty is a major problem in the area and the cost of living is high.
- 'Parc hwyiaid' is full of broken glas.
- Need more CCTV in the area.
- The town centre and the feeling that it is unsafe, especially after dark.

- Health and wellbeing e.g. matters relating to usage of correct pronouns and having trouble changing names on medical records; long time to get an appointment; insufficient mental health support.
- Not enough education about the LGBT+ community. Everyone needs to put in the effort to learn.
- Anti-social behaviour.
- Unable to afford driving lessons too expensive to get lessons, license and test.

## What changes would you like to see happen in the area that would make it a better place to live?

- Late Cafes for young people.
- A pub for the LGBT+ community.
- More community support workers.
- More safe places to socialise.
- Being able to see live bus times like in the cities.
- See bus driver salaries go up.
- An under 25 bus pass.
- Tackle negative attitudes towards the LGBT+ community.
