


# STATUTORY CONSULTATION DOCUMENT



**Bangor Catchment Area Schools**

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#### **Foreword**

At a Gwynedd Council Cabinet meeting held on **13 March 2018**, the Cabinet agreed to progress a statutory consultation on a proposal to re-organise schools in the Bangor catchment area, in accordance with the requirements of Section 48 of the School Standards and Organisation Act 2013.

The statutory consultation will be held between **10 April** and **22 May 2018** and is based on a proposal to close Ysgol Glanadda and Ysgol Coed Mawr on 31 August 2020 and offer pupils a place at Ysgol y Garnedd (subject to parental choice) and increase the capacity of Ysgol y Garnedd to 420 pupils.

Gwynedd Council invites you to put forward your views for consideration before a decision is made. At the end of the consultation period, a report will be submitted to Gwynedd Council Cabinet.

#### 1. Introduction


Gwynedd Council is considering re-organising schools within the Bangor catchment area.

There are 11 schools within the Bangor catchment area, two secondary schools (Ysgol Uwchradd Tryfan and Friars) and 9 primary schools (Ysgol Gynradd Y Garnedd, Hirael, Y Faenol, Llandygai, Cae Top, Glancegin, Babanod Coedmawr, Glanadda and Ein Harglwyddes). The schools are situated within and around the City of Bangor. The catchment area for Ysgol y Garnedd and Ein Harglwyddes includes the whole of Bangor. A new school building was opened at Ysgol Cae Top in September 2009 following an Investment of £4million. It is apparent that Ysgol Llandygai admits children from two catchment-areas, namely Bangor and Bethesda.

Gwynedd Council has considered several options for primary education in Bangor in order to ensure a sustainable provision for the future, responding in particular to an increase in the demand for places in the Penrhosgarnedd area and improving the provision for learners in the City. This document outlines the consultation process, the factors that the Council considers relevant and the decision-making process.

#### 1.1 The Proposal Relating to this Statutory Consultation

Close Ysgol Glanadda and Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr on the 31 August 2020, and offer pupils a place at Ysgol y Garnedd (subject to parental choice); and increase the capacity of Ysgol Y Garnedd to 420.



#### 1.2 The Vision for the Catchment Area

The statutory consultation relates to Ysgol y Garnedd, Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda only. However, the re-organisation that is taking place in the city of Bangor forms part of Gwynedd Council's long-term vision for the catchment area.

Extend Y Faenol increasing capacity from 186 to 315. New school for Garnedd increasing capacity from 210 to 420. Close Ysgol Babanod Coed Mawr and Glanadda. Increase the capacity of Glancegin to receive additional foundation phase pupils. Improvements to part of Ysgol Hirael. Consideration given to Secondary provision to include the condition of existing buildings and a new build for Ysgol Ein Harglwyddes.

In addition to the proposal to consult on the option to close Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda and increase the size of Ysgol y Garnedd, work will continue on the elements below.

- Y Faenol: As part of the favoured option, the need to increase the capacity of Ysgol Y Faenol has been identified to address a possible increase in pupil numbers stemming from factors such as housing developments at Penrhosgarnedd, and the current capacity of the school. The next step in the process will be to delegate the authority to the Cabinet Member for Education to hold a prior consultation with the trustees and/or the appropriate religious body in accordance with the requirements of the Schools Organisation Code 2013.
- Ysgol Glancegin: As part of the Band A 21st Century Schools Programme, the Council secured £5.11m towards building a new school for 240 pupils (including 30 nursery places) at Maesgeirchen to replace the current Ysgol Glancegin. When the original application was submitted, there were a substantial number of surplus places at the school, with a number of children attending other schools in the catchment area. If numbers continue to increase, some children in the catchment area may have to be refused admission. In order to resolve the situation, an assessment will need to be held to include provision for an additional class for 30 pupils at the school. The original scheme for the new building provided flexibility to adapt some areas in case there was future growth in pupil numbers in the catchment area.
- **Ysgol Hirael:** Sections of the building are in poor condition, with the flat roof building at the rear requiring attention. A further assessment will be made of the options for improvements.
- Ysgol Ein Harglwyddes: The state of this school's buildings was identified during CRP discussions as an element which will require attention in the future. For Voluntary Aided Schools (VA), funding arrangements involve an intervention rate of up to 85% by the Welsh Government and 15% by the appropriate Diocese. Further discussions will be held with the Diocese to obtain an understanding of the possibilities of improving the school's condition within strategic capital schemes.

# 2. The Consultation

This consultation will be held between 10 April and 22 May 2018.

The consultation relates to Ysgol y Garnedd, Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda, and therefore responses to this consultation should comment on the proposal as described in paragraph 1.1 above.

# 3. Background Details

#### 3.1 How the Proposal was Developed

The proposal was developed in line with achieving the aims of existing strategies. The "Excellent Primary Education of the Best Quality for the Children of Gwynedd" Strategy was submitted to the Full Council on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 2009. The strategy aimed to review primary schools in line with secondary catchment areas, and the criteria were established in order to prioritise the catchment areas which should be reviewed in Gwynedd.

The Strategy was unanimously accepted by the Council, with the vision being to:

"Provide education of the highest possible quality that will provide the county's children with the experiences, skills and confidence to develop into bilingual, successful and well-rounded citizens".

Six principal aims are identified within the strategy, namely:

- 1) Appropriately-sized classes and high quality school leadership
- 2) Promote and strengthen the Welsh language
- 3) Develop a pro-active and creative long-term scheme
- 4) Make the best use of available resources
- 5) Create a learning environment of the best possible quality for the County's children and teachers
- 6) Develop schools into establishments that are central to community activity.

The following strategies and objectives were also considered as the proposal developed:

- Towards 2025 The Future of Education and Training for Children and Young People in Gwynedd
- 21<sup>st</sup> Century Schools Strategy
- Gwynedd Welsh Language Strategy

At the end of 2016, the Welsh Government announced that there was an opportunity for Local Authorities with the capacity, to fulfil additional projects within Band A of the 21st Century Schools Programme. This confirmation enabled the Council to commence the review of the current education provision in Bangor as part of a proposed financial package worth £12,730,000, which would include a contribution from the Council.

The review would take into account the impact of the new housing developments in Bangor on the capacity of local schools' to admit pupils. A developer has obtained planning permission to build 245 dwellings, with several houses already built. The firm is committed to contributing £1,115,387 towards adapting the primary educational provision in Bangor.

At the Cabinet meeting held on 17 January 2017, a recommendation was approved, "to request permission to commence local discussions as outlined in the report on reviewing primary education provision in Bangor"

#### 3.2 Catchment Review Panel (CRP) Bangor

The Bangor Catchment Review Panel (CRP) was established during June 2017, several meetings were held between June and November 2017, with the last meeting held on 29 November 2017. Representatives were invited from each of the schools within the catchment area, including, head teachers, chairs of the governors and a parent governor. An invitation was also extended to local councillors, a representative of the Church in Wales (Bangor Diocese) and the Catholic Church.

During the meetings, several options for primary education in Bangor were considered in relation to future sustainability, including an appropriate response to an increase in the demand for places in the Penrhosgarnedd area and improving provision for the city's learners. As part of the process, several aims for consideration were identified for learning provision in the Bangor catchment area namely to:

- Ensure an adequate number of places for every child in the appropriate locations;
- Ensure that no school is overcrowded;
- Ensure that no school is assessed as being in condition C or worse;
- Reduce substantial surplus places in schools or increase effectiveness;
- Reduce range cost per head for educational provision in the catchment-area;
- Ensure that class sizes are appropriate in the primary schools;
- Ensure that there are not over 25 pupils of the same age in one class;
- Ensure that there are no more than 20 pupils of different ages in one class;
- Reconcile the quality of education in the catchment-area;
- Ensure that no head teacher spends more than 20% of their time teaching;
- Develop the use of schools as a community resource;
- Improve additional learning needs provision in the catchment area.

The main issues identified by the CRP members were:

 The need for any option to include improvements and increase capacity for some Bangor school buildings

- Consideration could be given to any impact from the traffic situation in Penrhosgarnedd.
- Consideration of language issues
- Ensuring appropriate arrangements for the children of Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol
   Glanadda
- The consideration of any suitable development sites available in Bangor.

Following the input of CRP members and the presentation of a shortlist of possible options, a questionnaire was sent to members of the CRP to submit comments from the relevant schools regarding the proposed options. In terms of the comments received, the response favoured options 3 and 10.

#### Option 3

Extend Y Faenol increasing capacity from 186 to 315. New school for Garnedd increasing capacity from 210 to 420. Close Ysgol Coed Mawr and Glanadda. Increase the capacity of Glancegin to receive additional foundation phase pupils. Improvements to part of Ysgol Hirael. Consideration given to Secondary provision to include the condition of existing buildings and a new build for Ysgol Ein Harglwyddes.

#### Option 10

Increase Y Faenol capacity (270). Garnedd to move to a new site and capacity increased (330). Modify the Glanadda site to accept Coed Mawr pupils (90). Increase the capacity of Glancegin to receive additional foundation phase pupils. Improvements to part of Ysgol Hirael. Consideration given to Secondary provision to include the condition of existing buildings and a new build for Ysgol Ein Harglwyddes.

#### 3.3 Capital Investment

The size of the package available to modernise the provision of primary education in the City of Bangor is an important part of the context. After discussions began in the catchment area, a capital investment programme was adopted by the Welsh Government under the banner of the 21st Century Schools Programme. It would potentially include a total investment of £12.7 million, of which £6.35 million being a grant from the Welsh Government. There is also a commitment from a housing development company as part of an agreement for a new development at Goetre Uchaf in Penrhosgarnedd.

The grant from the Welsh Government has been approved following the submission of a full business case. In order to ensure that a change in the direction of the Project does not affect compliance with the terms and conditions of the grant, the published options being considered by the options appraisal (section 5.4) have been developed within the context of the needs of the business case.

# 4. Existing Arrangements in Bangor

Existing primary provision in the Bangor catchment area includes, 9 primary schools (Ysgol Y Garnedd, Hirael, Y Faenol, Llandygai, Cae Top, Glancegin, Babanod Coedmawr, Glanadda and Ein Harglwyddes).

#### Schools which are the Subject of the Consultation:

#### 4.1 Ysgol y Garnedd

- Ysgol y Garnedd serves Bangor as a whole including surrounding villages such as Tal-y-Bont and Llandygai.
- The school has 338 pupils on the register
- 7.5% of pupils are entitled to free school meals, which is lower than the 13.8% average for the County.
- 67.2% of pupils speak Welsh at home.

#### 4.2 Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Glanadda

- Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr is located on the outskirts of the City of Bangor.
- The pupils transfer to the junior site of Ysgol Glanadda when at 7 years old.
- The school provides Foundation Phase Education for pupils between the age of 3 and 7.
- The school has 28 pupils on the register.
- 45.6% of pupils are entitled to free school meals, compared to the 13.8% County average.
- 25% of pupils speak Welsh at home.
- Ysgol Glanadda is located on the western border of Bangor.
- There are 38 pupils between the ages of 7-11 on the register.
- The school has been federated with Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr
- The current federation is known as Ysgol Bro Ddewi, which was formed as a federation in 2011 with one head teacher over two sites.
- 30.3% of pupils are entitled to free school meals, compared to the 13.8% County average.
- 25% of pupils speak Welsh at home.

#### Other Primary Schools which are part of the Catchment Area:

#### 4.3 Ysgol Y Faenol

- Ysgol Y Faenol is Voluntary Controlled by the Church in Wales and is located in Penrhosgarnedd.
- There are 219 pupils on the school register.
- 4.1% of pupils are entitled to free school meals, which is lower than the County average of 13.8%
- 13.3% of pupils speak Welsh at home.

#### 4.4 Ysgol Cae Top

- Ysgol Cae Top is Voluntary Controlled by the Church in Wales.
- The school is located in Bangor
- There are 239 pupils on the register
- 12.5% of pupils are entitled to free school meals, which is lower than the County average of 13.8%
- 37.5% of pupils speak Welsh at home

#### 4.5 Ysgol Ein Harglwyddes

- Ysgol Ein Harglwyddes is a Voluntary Aided Catholic school, which is located on the outskirts of the City of Bangor.
- It services the Catholic parishes of Bethesda, Menai Bridge, Llangefni, some pupils travel from afar to be taught in the school.
- There are 123 pupils on the register.
- 12.5% of pupils are entitled to free school meals which is lower than the County average of 13.8%
- 3.2% of pupils speak Welsh at home.

#### 4.6 Ysgol Glancegin

- Ysgol Glancegin is located within Maesgeirchen Estate in Bangor.
- There are 251 pupils on the register, with the majority coming from the estate.
- A new school was opened in September 2017.
- 36.1% of pupils are entitled to free school meals which is higher than the county average of 13.8%
- 24.1% of pupils speak Welsh at home.

#### 4.7 Ysgol Llandygai

- Ysgol Llandygai is located in the village of Llandygai which is located outside Bangor.
- The school is Voluntary Controlled by the Church in Wales
- There are 149 pupils on the register
- 20.7% of pupils are entitled to free school meals, which is higher than the County average of 13.8%
- 29 % of pupils speak Welsh at home

#### 4.8 Ysgol Hirael

- Ysgol Hirael is located on the north side of the City of Bangor.
- There are 195 pupils on the register
- 22.1% pupils are entitled to free school meals with the County average being 13.8%
- 13.3% of pupils speak Welsh at home.

#### 4.9 School Categories

Gwynedd schools are defined as Community, Voluntary Aided (VA) or Voluntary Controlled (VC). In addition, Voluntary Aided or Voluntary Controlled Schools can be designated with religious character i.e. as Church of Wales Schools.

Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr, Ysgol Glanadda and Ysgol Y Garnedd are Community schools

# 5 Case for change

#### 5.1 Background

The area has been prioritised for a review of the existing educational provision as it faces several challenges including:

- Two schools in the Penrhosgarnedd catchment area are substantially over capacity, namely Ysgol Y Garnedd and Ysgol Y Faenol. In September 2017, Ysgol Y Faenol was 20 places above capacity, and Ysgol Y Garnedd 95 above capacity.
- New housing developments in Bangor will potentially impact on the capacity of local schools to admit pupils. A developer has obtained planning permission to build 245 dwellings, and several houses have already been built.
- Ysgol Coedmawr has 57% surplus places and Ysgol Glanadda has 42% surplus places
- All other primary schools in Bangor have no more than 10% surplus places and 5 out of the ten primary schools are full, with some where pupil numbers exceed capacity.
- The cost per pupil in the majority of the catchment area's primary schools are slightly below the county average of £3,777, with Coedmawr (£6,525), Glanadda Schools (£5,052) substantially higher. There is a range in cost per pupil between two primary schools in Bangor of £3,414, between Coedmawr (£6,525) and Ysgol Garnedd (£3,111).
- Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr receives £32,520 of additional annual funding through "Minimum staffing protection"
- Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Glanadda are under the leadership of an acting head teacher due to recruitment problems.
- There are inconsistencies in relation to teaching quality

The aim for the proposed investment is that it will address Gwynedd Council and Welsh Government strategic goals to deliver sustainable Welsh medium education provision, including:

- Better consistency in the standard and quality of education provided in the catchment area
- Improving the efficiency of the school estate by reducing the number of buildings in poor condition
- Making a significant contribution towards reducing surplus places
- Releasing funding to be spent on children within the education system rather than on buildings
- Reconciling the number of schools to match the need
- Rationalising the cost per pupil in schools, by reducing the cost per pupil to equal or better than the County average of £3,777 for primary.
- Better consistency in the size of classes and a reduction in the age range within primary school classes
- Improving the learning environment for more pupils and increasing the number of pupils who will benefit from a 21<sup>st</sup> Century learning environment
- Ensuring strong leadership and management

Pupil numbers attending Ysgol Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda are low compared to the remaining schools in Bangor. In September 2017, there were 28 pupils at Ysgol Coedmawr and 41 pupils at Ysgol Glanadda with a total of 69 (Nursery- Yr.6) on both schools registers, whilst 224 of pupils within the catchment-area opted to attend other primary schools (Ysgol Y Garnedd admit the largest number with 78 pupils from Coedmawr and Glanadda catchment area).

#### 5.2 Pupil Population and Projections

Pupil numbers in Gwynedd schools have varied since 1975, however, in general there has been a decline of around 18% in the number of pupils across the county. Therefore, resources are spent each year on maintaining inefficient buildings and systems rather than on education for children and young people.

The below table summarises pupil numbers in the catchment area between 1980 and 2017.

The table shows that Ysgol Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda pupil numbers for September 2017 are at their lowest for the last 25 years. A substantial change has occurred in pupil numbers since 1980, with a reduction of 62% at Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and 68% at Ysgol Glanadda. In contrast, numbers at Ysgol y Garnedd have increased by 55% in the same period.

### 5.3 Evaluating Different Options

#### **Possible Options**

A number of options were discussed prior to creating the long list of options. These options were based on the potential way forward after considering all of the schools within the catchment area and by seeking ways which would maintain and improve educational standards in the catchment area.

#### The options included:

- Developing co-operation/federation options between some or all of the curent schools without closing schools.
- Developing co-operation/federation options between some or all of the curent schools after closing some schools.
- Closing some primary schools by transferring pupils to nearby schools without capital Investment or co-operation between the remaining schools.
- Closing some primary schools by transferring pupils to nearby schools without capital Investment and establishing a co-operation between the remaining schools.
- Closing some primary schools and establishing new schools following capital Investment
- Establish one 3-18 school on one site for the pupils of the entire catchment area.

# 5.4 Long List of Possible Options

A long list of options was created following discussions with CRP members:

Option 12	Extend Y Faenol to increase the capacity from 186 to 360. New school for Garnedd increasing capacity from 210 to 330. Close Ysgol Coed Mawr and Glanadda with pupils sent to Ysgol Y Faenol. Increase the capacity of Glancegin to receive additional foundation phase pupils. Improvements to part of Ysgol Hirael. Consideration given to Secondary provision to include the condition of existing buildings and a new build for Ysgol Ein Harglwyddes.

## 5.5 Options Appraisal

An options appraisal was completed in order to summarise the main advantages and disadvantages of the options considered as part of the long list of possible options. All the options were evaluated against the CRP factors, taking into account the School Organisation Code 2013, Gwynedd Council Re-organisation Strategy, the Bangor catchment areas vision and other relevant factors.

A copy of the full options appraisal has been included as an annex to this document.

# 6. The Proposal

#### Summary of the Proposal

Following the appraisal of the possible options, the preferred direction and the proposal which is the subject of the statutory consultation is to close Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda and build a new school for Ysgol y Garnedd with a capacity of 420.

This would include the relocation of Ysgol y Garnedd on an adjacent site and offer places for pupils from Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda at Ysgol y Garnedd (subject to parental choice).

As with any similar situation, parents have the right to choose alternative locations for their children if they so wish. Due to the fact that Ysgol y Faenol will also be subject to change during the same time as the development of the new building on the Garnedd site, it is possible that some parents will choose this school for the education of their children.

This option would mean:

- a) Building a school with the a 21st Century Schools standards, and the highest curriculum standard.
- b) An improved working environment for staff
- c) A reduction in building and maintenance costs
- d) Reconciliation of the cost per pupil allowance
- e) Reducing the number of surplus spaces within the schools.

This section outlines the reasons why this option is the preferred option and why this is the subject of the statutory consultation.

#### 6.1 Quality of Education

The Council is committed to providing education of the best possible quality which will provide the County's children with the experiences, skills and confidence to develop into bilingual, successful and well-rounded citizens.

It remains a high priority to provide the best possible learning experience for all learners within the County, ensuring an exciting and broad curriculum, as well as the extra-curricular activities which motivate pupils to learn and understand leading to improved standards.

The Council has decided to invest in school re-organisation, in order to improve and secure consistency in pupils' educational and learning attainment. It also seeks to reduce the difference in performance between schools and within schools.

Leadership, good governance and management are key factors in ensuring that schools, which are underperforming, improve their performance.

**Ysgol y Garnedd** has been categorised green which means it is a "a highly effective school which is well run, has strong leadership and is clear about its priorities for improvements"

**Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr** is designated Yellow "an effective school that is already doing well and knows what areas it needs to improve"

**Ysgol Glanadda** is designated as amber "a school that needs improvement and needs support to identify the steps to improve"

Quality of Education and Standards Within the Three Schools which are Part of the Statutory Consultation:

Estyn inspection reports indicate that the standard of education provision for the three schools varies.

#### Ysgol y Garnedd

During the last inspection by Estyn October 2012. Estyn noted that the performance of Ysgol Garnedd was good with the school's prospects for improvement as excellent.

"Pupils enjoy being at school, and their behaviour and commitment to learning are excellent"

In addition, it has been identified that teacher work well together to develop detailed schemes of work for pupils. It was mentioned that the work of the Autism Unit was outstanding, also particularly good support

for pupils of additional learning needs. The report also highlighted that pupils made very good progress with some aspects of learning being outstanding.

#### Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr

During the last inspection in January 2015, it was noted that the school was adequate with prospects for improving the school also adequate.

"Pupils across the school show an interest in their work and their behaviour and attitudes towards learning are good"

It was also noted that pupils made appropriate progress during their time at the School. However, it was noted that "the school performance at the end of the Foundation Phase places it consistently in the lower 50% or the bottom 25% in comparison with similar schools". It was mentioned that the attendance rate remained low. They declared "Staff don't plan enough different activities to challenge pupils of higher ability appropriately"

#### Ysgol Glanadda

In the February 2013 inspection, it was noted that the school was adequate with prospects for improvement unsatisfactory. It was also noted that the school has a "happy and caring" community. The report mentioned that "the pupils' personal, social and life skills develop well and prepare them well for life and work outside of school"

The report stated that "there is not enough progress in reading and writing skills of many pupils in both languages" as well as noted; "there is not enough of a challenge to ensure that the most able pupils make appropriate progress across the curriculum";

# 6.2 Summary of the Effect of the Current Proposal on Improving Educational Standards

By moving with the preferred option to close Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda and moving the pupils to Ysgol y Garnedd (subject to parental choice) would align the education provision and ensure that the children receive the best possible education for the future.

The proposal will not impact on the delivery of the full curriculum including the foundation phase as Ysgol y Garnedd already provides education for the foundation phase and key stage 2.

#### 6.3 School Capacity

#### Appropriate Class Size and Age Range

Our expectation is that as far as possible, there will be appropriately sized classes in primary schools so that children within the county receive the best possible experiences and opportunities.

Gwynedd Council aims to have class sizes of between 12-25 pupils, where children are all of the same age range. The table below shows current class sizes in the Bangor catchment area.

Gwynedd Council is currently consulting on adopting new principles and provide future education system foundations which will be fit for purpose. A proposed education system for primary schools has been assessed based on general principles:

- Leadership arrangements which aim to offer 80% of non-contact time for the headteacher
- Classes of no more than two age-groups.

These objectives would address the biggest challenge that the primary sector faces, headteachers with inadequate time to lead, and teachers in small schools who have to teach a broad range of children of various ages and abilities within the same class.

In September, 2017, Ysgol y Garnedd was substantially over capacity with 95 over the capacity.

Increasing the size of Ysgol Y Garnedd to 420 would lead to a structure which would include two classes for each age-group i.e. access and space for 60 pupils in every year group, between Reception and Year Six groups. It is envisaged that the age range peaks within classes which exist in some schools will disappear, which would reduce the challenges and problems of effective learning and teaching that may occur when there is a wide age range in a class.

The table below shows the current class size of Ysgol y Garnedd, Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda. Currently, children are taught in age groups that span two age ranges. Numbers in classes vary from school to school and affect pupils' educational experience - class sizes range from 17 to 30.

Through closing Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda, and transferring pupils to the new Ysgol y Garnedd, the educational provision would combine the existing primary educational provision, leading to greater consistency in class sizes.

It would be a matter for the Governors of Ysgol y Garnedd to determine the size and distribution of school staff resources.

#### 6.4 Management and Leadership

Gwynedd Council recognises the importance of strong leadership at a school as a means of maintaining and improving standards. The following steps have been implemented to ensure strong leadership in Gwynedd schools for the future:

- GwE train a Senior manager from every secondary school to develop their personal leadership skills, and to develop their schools middle managers;
- Successful schools share good practice and hold Leadership Development dates for the managers of the rest of the schools;
- School to school plans ensure that school leaders collaborate and develop a leader's specialisation;
- Encourage prospective leaders to gain NPQH qualification;
- Headteachers mentoring scheme;
- Catchment Area Strategy Leader Pilot Scheme implemented to promote and develop strategic leadership in Gwynedd

Our expectation is that head teachers will have a fair opportunity to provide professional leadership and management for their schools. In addition, we expect school governing bodies to lead schools effectively within their budgets for the benefit of pupils. We expect schools to have the best staff to provide education of the highest quality.

Leadership at Y Garnedd has been recognised by Estyn (2012) as "excellent", with the Headteacher and Senior Management team providing robust leadership.

Currently, neither Ysgol Coedmawr nor Glanadda has a permanent headteacher. Rather there are two Assistant Headteachers, together with an Acting Headteacher on a non-contact basis. In addition, the Assistant Headteachers are responsible for managing the sites as well as teaching.

The situation at Glanadda and Coedmawr schools has been one of the main considerations for change, with a vulnerable situation related to a lack of robust leadership arrangements. This has provided a short-term solution, but a long-term solution is now required.

#### Impact on leadership and management

Work conditions are required that enable headteachers to establish a productive and positive environment in order for pupils to reach their potential. In addition, headteachers are responsible for setting up a culture of continuous improvement which is evaluated and offers support to the teachers and other middle managers in their schools. One of the biggest challenges facing the primary sector is that headteachers do not have sufficient time to lead in very small schools, and that there is a need to teach a wide range of children of different ages and abilities in the same class. Estyn (2013) states:

"Leadership and processes to improve quality are usually better developed in large primary schools. In small primary schools, many headteachers have a significant teaching responsibility that limits the time they can devote to leading and managing and they have fewer opportunities to evaluate standards and to drive improvement."

Schools with high numbers of children such as Ysgol y Garnedd can offer a more robust structure to plan and deliver the curriculum through the establishment of middle management teams and subject and curriculum leaders. In addition, many responsibilities such as those relating to the curriculum and management issues, which can be a burden for small schools, e.g. appraisal arrangements, development plans, performance management can be centralised. It is more challenging for smaller schools to be able to create specific professional development training and development plans, and offer reasonable opportunities for staff to develop subject expertise and share good practice with peers.

#### 6.5 Condition and Suitability of Buildings

The Council aims to provide quality primary education buildings within the county through structured planning, providing head teachers and teachers with appropriate rooms and access to playing fields and an appropriate hall for children. Buildings also need to comply with Foundation Phase and curriculum requirements.

The Welsh Government's 21st Century Schools Programme states that the teaching environment is an important factor in the provision of education.

The Estyn report "Evaluation of the performance of schools before and after moving into new buildings or renovated property" (2007) confirms the above opinion. The report notes that schools which have seen their buildings being renovated have noticed an improvement in pupils' achievement and attainment. It notes that Estyn reports on individual schools show that the quality of the teaching has improved, that staff morale is higher, that attendance has been maintained and that behaviour has improved. In addition, buildings which have been improved, offer better choice and provision in terms of education within the school and activities held before and after school hours.

Our expectation is that the "learning environment" for the county's children and teachers (i.e. the condition of the school, classroom, staff room, play provision) meets 21st century school teaching and learning requirements. There is real concern about the condition and suitability of the county's primary schools. The

buildings require substantial investment to address health and safety matters and to achieve appropriate standards. A number of school buildings are in poor condition. The cost of upgrading and adapting the county's school buildings to meet new curriculum requirements and expected standards are substantial.

The table below includes the condition and suitability of Ysgol y Garnedd, Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda's buildings, as well as the maintenance costs required.

The Council undertakes annual condition surveys of all its properties. The annual surveys inform the Authority's Asset Management Plan and enables the prioritisation of the repair and maintenance planned works programme in schools. These surveys have also led to a substantial increase in repair and maintenance budgets since 2009/10.

#### Ysgol y Garnedd

Almost all elements of the structure now need work. Extensive parts of the structure are made of wood and thus maintenance can be difficult. The number of pupils in the School is more than the school's official capacity, with a number of pupils being educated in an unsuitable space. Class size is too small.

#### Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr

Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr is not in a good condition and needs to be re-wired, the flat roofs refurbished, new windows and work completed on the kitchen. It can be maintained but it will not be of standard construction and will require ongoing investment. The school's plan is rigid and the size of classrooms is not to the current standards. The site is limited and cannot be expanded

#### Ysgol Glanadda


Ysgol Glanadda is a Victorian stone building and can be maintained continuously. The windows, roof and kitchen needs work. Otherwise it is in an acceptable condition. The school's plan is rigid and the size of classrooms is not to the current standards.

#### 6.6 Details of the Proposal

Following the completion of the ECI tender process (Early Contractor Involvement), a company has been identified to assist the design team to plan the new school in terms of cost effectiveness and buildability. This work has already started. The construction work is scheduled to start in October this year and the school's construction programme is expected to be completed by the Easter term 2019. Below is the Architect's (AGA) first edition of the design for the new school.







The initial high level design was prepared following a number of site visits and meetings with project stakeholders.

An important objective in the design will be to improve the flow of people through the building and improve the suitability of the children's learning environment. Organising the internal spaces will enable the School to control access to the hall space and the 'community' area by carefully arranging a timetable and improving access.

Aspects of the design include elements that have been identified as examples of best practice from previous projects completed by the Authority and other projects completed within the 21st Century Schools Programme. For example, innovative features such as toilets in an open area to prevent bullying, and flexible learning spaces. In addition, the design considers those suitability issues that currently hinder learning.

The table below gives details of the different elements which would include as part of the new school's construction work, as well as the associated benefits.

#### 6.7 Proposed Transport Arrangements

Gwynedd Council's strategy for both primary and secondary education is that it aims to limit home to school travel to a maximum one-way journey of 45 minutes. Free transport is available for primary school pupils who live 2 miles or more from the school in their catchment area and secondary school pupils under 16 that live 3 miles or more from the school.

When moving to the new building, it is not envisaged that any pupil will be required to travel an unreasonable distance to reach an educational site, in accordance with the strategy. Ysgol Glanadda is situated 0.8 of a mile away from the current site of Ysgol Y Garnedd, with Ysgol Coedmawr situated 0.3 of a mile away. Transport would be provided in accordance with the County's schools Transport Policy, and no increase is envisaged in Transport costs following the implementation of the preferred option.

The number of pupils who attend the two schools Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda walk to the school. The proposal will be such that those pupils who currently walk to school will continue to do so to attend Ysgol y Garnedd.

#### 6.8 Surplus Places

#### **National Targets for Authorities**

The Council needs to reduce the number of surplus spaces in order to match the targets set out by the Welsh Government and to follow the recommendations which were made by Estyn in their Authority educational provision report in March 2013.

Reducing the number of surplus spaces will ensure that a higher percentage of the Authority's Education budget is spent directly on education rather than maintaining a costly and ineffective school infrastructure, which is unsustainable for the future.

Local Authorities are expected to manage the changes in catchment areas to ensure that demand and growth in the pupil population is considered when making a decision to establish a new school or extend an existing building. The choice of site and the option for a new school must ensure that sustainability and reducing the number of surplus places are at the core of the project's objectives.

Planning for the future of education in different catchment areas therefore needs to reflect trends in terms of population and primary pupil numbers. The Council has already taken initial steps to respond to this challenge and this proposal directly contributes to the objective of reducing surplus places and establishing a sustainable education system. In a post inspection visit in 2014 to monitor the specific recommendation made to the County of reducing surplus places, Estyn reached the positive conclusion that the Council was meeting the challenge "to a great extent".

#### Financial Costs of Surplus Places

According to Estyn, closing and combining schools is one way of reducing surplus places, releasing savings for reinvestment and raising standards. Where there are educational and sound reasons for doing so, this is an approach Gwynedd Council will follow. However, how surplus capacity is addressed, will vary from catchment to catchment according to the particular situation and requirements of each catchment area.

There are a high number of surplus places in Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Glanadda compared to their capacity. Ysgol Coedmawr has 57% empty places and Ysgol Glanadda has 42% empty places. In contrast, all other primary schools in Bangor have no more than 10% empty places and 5 out of the ten primary schools are full, with some where pupil numbers exceed capacity.

Estyn has placed a notional cost of one surplus place in a primary school at £262 and the cost of a surplus place in a secondary school at £510. The cost of the surplus places in Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Glanadda, based on Estyn's data is as follows:

Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr has 30 empty spaces within the school which means a total cost of £7,860 and in the same instance Ysgol Glanadda has 32 surplace places with a total of £8,384.

Although the cost of surplus places is a factor that needs to be taken into account as part of the reorganisation process, it is not the sole driver. However, we have to be aware of the effects and implications of substantial expenditure on schools which have a high percentage of surplus places — especially the impact and implications that this has on the budget which reaches the pupils, and balance this against other factors which are relevant when considering what is best for pupils in the catchment area.

#### 6.9 Financial Resources

The expectation is that Gwynedd makes the best possible use of financial resources available for the provision of education in the county. It is also sensible, wherever possible to make to make the best use of resources across the county by reducing the range of cost per pupil.

This is even more important with the extremely challenging financial climate facing the Council at present. It is therefore important that efforts are made to utilise resources as effectively as possible within the education and training system for the benefit of children and young people. This includes all resources – human, technical, construction and financial. In particular, a substantial proportion of the Education budget is spent on maintaining a very expensive and inefficient school infrastructure which in many cases was designed in the last century, or during the Victorian era. In addition there is a substantial expenditure on schools where there is a large percentage of surplus places.

The expenditure per pupil varies greatly from school to school.

For the 21<sup>st</sup> Century, there is a need to ensure that Gwynedd has a network of schools of the correct type at the appropriate locations across the county. Reducing the number of empty places and ensuring robust schools regarding size, would provide opportunities to develop inclusive and community-focused elements. Such a course of action is crucial if equal opportunities are to be promoted across the county and the impact of poverty in children and young people's lives is to be reduced.

A total of £5,231,881 was allocated to the catchment primary schools for 2017/18. This corresponds to £3,527 per pupil on average, compared to the average primary pupil cost of £3,777.

By establishing the new building for Ysgol y Garnedd, and transferring Ysgol Coedmawr and Glanadda pupils to the new site, it is predicted that the proposal could lead to revenue saving of approximately £107,519 compared to the current situation.

It has to be recognised that national NNDR calculation arrangements (building's tax), leads to an increase following capital Investment, but with the NNDR fund being disseminated to authorities, it could be argued that this matter should not be ignored when identifying revenue savings.

#### 6.10 The Welsh Language

We expect that the County's primary schools support and improve the use of the Welsh language as a social language and as the educational language of our pupils.

In developing any proposals relating to school reorganisation, consideration must be given to the impact on the Welsh language. Maintaining and increasing the use of Welsh as a social language and a language for education is always an essential consideration in planning proposals and assessing options.

A language assessment was completed on all 12 possible long listed options in order to compare the impact they would have on the Welsh language in the area. A copy of the assessment report is included in the background pack which is available on the Council's website at, www.gwynedd.llyw.cymru/modernisingeducation

Any discussions on education re-organisation in the catchment-area and providing more opportunities for learners needs to note Welsh Government's efforts to achieve the objective of a million Welsh speakers by 2050. The Welsh Government has specifically asked Gwynedd Council to work with them to disseminate Language Charter practices throughout Wales by 2019. This follows the sweeping success of the pilot scheme in 2015-16 between Gwynedd and the Welsh Government where all North Wales regional authorities achieved the Charter bronze award.

Work on developing the Language Charter to be a national programme is a key part of a broader framework that the Welsh Government is developing to increase use of Welsh amongst children and young people. The Framework will address interventions within three main fields, the educational system, the community, and change in language behaviour. The focus tries to integrate these three fields as well as try and bring the education policy and overall use of language policy closer together. The Framework will therefore support the objective of providing more opportunities for learners in the catchment-area.

The options to close Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda schools also include developing a substantial extension to Ysgol Y Garnedd. It is therefore expected that the majority of pupils who would attend these schools would attend Ysgol Y Garnedd, conditional on parents preference. When considering that the majority of Glanadda pupils are confident Welsh speakers, think that speaking Welsh is important and "always" speak Welsh with their teachers, the assessment notes that they would be likely to be comfortable in the Welsh culture of Ysgol y Garnedd without excessively changing the language spoken in class.

Through increasing capacity at Ysgol y Garnedd, it is expected that more children from non-Welsh speaking homes will attend the school. It is possible that the school's Welsh cultures will maintain, and that pupils from non-Welsh homes will frequently use Welsh as already observed at Y Garnedd. The figures indicate that given robust leadership by the teachers, a school can impact use of Welsh within school classes. It is expected that this will remain strong at Y Garnedd following increased capacity. It is possible that increasing capacity at Ysgol y Garnedd would increase the percentage who speak Welsh "every time" on the playground. However, the non-Welsh speakers will have more opportunities to integrate and socialize with children who speak Welsh in the classes and on the playground.

#### 6.11 The Community

The Council undertook a community impact assessment on all 12 of the possible long listed options in order to compare the impact they would have on the communities affected. The full community assessment report is included in the background pack or on the Council's website <a href="https://www.gwynedd.llyw.cymru/modernisingeducation">www.gwynedd.llyw.cymru/modernisingeducation</a>.

In developing any proposals involving modernising education, full consideration must be given to the possible community impact.

The assessment noted, through the closure of Glanadda and Coedmawr sites, that certain elements of community events will be lost. However, other schools in the area such as Ysgol Y Garnedd already make similar use of the school building and consequently, similar community use could continue.

The assessment's conclusion notes that there is no reason why any of the options should have a negative impact on the community.

In the case of the communities whose schools will close, we suggest the adoption of some measures which will alleviate the negative impact. The alleviation measures will be discussed by the Council as measures to be borne in mind if the decision is taken to implement the proposals in the catchment area:

- In order to create an inclusive spirit and a feeling of ownership, it should be ensured at the start of and throughout the transferral process that the Governors of every school are an integral part of the developments and decisions and that regular updates are circulated to parents.
- Appropriate consultations should be held with the local villages and communities regarding agreement on suitable use for school buildings for the future.
- The Council should ensure that school transport arrangements are suitable

If this option is implemented, appropriate consideration could be given to the mitigating actions noted here.

#### 6.12 Governance and Staffing Matters

#### **Governing Body**

Should the proposal to build a new school for Ysgol y Garnedd and close Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda be implemented. It would mean that the governing body for the federation of Ysgol Bro Ddewi would be dissolved if Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda were to close on the 31 August 2020.

No anticipated changes will be made to the current governing body of Ysgol y Garnedd.

#### Staffing Implications

Should the proposal to close Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Ysgol Glanadda on 31 August 2020 be implemented, there would be staffing obligations which would lead to redundancies due to the posts coming to an end when the schools close. Gwynedd Council has developed a redeployment policy model for schools, in conjunction with the Trade Unions and headteachers. It would be up to the Governing Body to decide whether to adopt, amend or decide not to implement this policy. Any redundancies resulting from a proposal would have to conform with the necessary employment law and the Gwynedd Redundancy scheme. Clear and open communication with staff will play a core part in implementing any proposal.

Should the proposal be approved to build a new school for Ysgol y Garnedd, it is not anticipated that there would be any changes to the curent staffing structure at Ysgol y Garnedd, as the staff would transfer directly to their posts in the new building.

In situations where schools would close, drop in sessions will be available where Human Resources officials from the Council will be present, should a member of staff wish to discuss the situation. Staff are welcome to contact the Human Resources department directly should they wish to have one to one discussions. A support package, including training if appropriate, will be offered to all staff affected by the proposal.

#### 6.13 Impact on Equality

An equality assessment was held on the short list of possible options. The assessment gives due focus to different equality elements such as race, gender, disability, language, religion, or belief and age-group. The assessment notes the current situation and policies and arrangements in place which would ensure that the proposal considers and aligns with equal rights.

The assessment notes that the favoured options are unlikely to have a negative impact on equality features, and it is expected that some of the features will have a positive impact. The principal objective of the scheme is to improve the educational provision in the catchment-area, ensuring that children in the area receive a good education and equal opportunities in high quality and fit for purpose buildings, and also to ensure the future viability of any improvements. There will be no change to the relevant schools policies on equality matters.

The Council follows agreed processes through supporting and monitoring, to ensure compliance by every school with the equality features. Estyn also inspect the schools and assess e quality aspects in accordance with their usual guidelines.

Through careful planning, the proposal could ensure that all pupils have access to the same resources and experiences.

This could be a way in which the Council could maintain standardised services in rural areas and reduce the number of surplus spaces. The challenges for this element include the successful management of a range of responsibilities thus ensuring that such duties do not affect the main responsibility of the organisation, namely promoting education.

#### 6.15 Proposed Admission Arrangements

The Education Department of Gwynedd Council would be the Admission Authority and would operate in accordance with the County's School Admission Policy.

#### 6.16 Information regarding Additional Learning Needs

The new building for Ysgol y Garnedd would ensure that the facilities offered are suitable for pupils with additional learning needs.

The 21st Century Schools Programme funding provides an opportunity to ensure better resources for ALN pupils in the area through giving due focus to:

A Language Resources Centre for pupils with specific language difficulties who would benefit from receiving intensive support for a short period. The objective of this provision is to try and achieve a long-term positive change in young people's language difficulties, and thus ensure their academic success.

A Social Communication Centre for pupils with social communication difficulties and a diagnosis of Autistic Spectrum Difficulty, who would benefit from receiving intensive support in the mainstream education system. This provision seeks to enable a long term positive change in young people's social communication skills, and thus ensure their academic, social and independent success.

#### 6.17 Future use of sites

Should the proposal be implemented there would be two sites which would no longer provide education. The Council has a post-use policy for school buildings and this would be followed. The Council would need to discuss and consider any legal binding terms or limitations which could come into effect should any of the sites cease to be a site for education provision.

- Voluntary Controlled (VC) with a religious designation (Church in Wales)



Currently Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr, Ysgol Glanadda and Ysgol y Garnedd have a community school category. On this basis, in terms of the legal category for the statutory consultation, it will remain as a community category.

# 7. Summary of the Proposal

This proposal would mean that Ysgol Babanod Coedmawr and Glanadda would close and a new school built for the existing Ysgol y Garnedd.



# 8. Explaining the Statutory Process

At the Cabinet meeting held on 17 January 2017, the recommendation was approved, "to request permission to commence local discussions as outlined in the report on reviewing primary education provision in Bangor"

The Cabinet supported the recommendation to proceed to hold a statutory consultation period on the favoured option. This is the consultation document, which contains details of the proposal. This document was published on 10th of April, 2018 and responses can be received until 13:00 Tuesday 22nd of May, 2018. These responses will not be counted as objections, but comments. If any one wishes to object they must do so following the publication of the statutory notice (should one be issued). During this consultation responses may include comments or questions on any aspect of the proposal (e.g. the option, sites involved, category etc.) or suggest alternative options.

Following this statutory consultation period, a report will be submitted to the Cabinet in June 2018 where a decision will be made whether or not to proceed with this proposal. This consultation report will be published on the Council's website and hard copies will be available on request. Parents, carers and guardians, staff and governors of all schools in the catchment area will be informed when the report is available. A number of representatives from other agencies will be informed that the consultation report is available e.g. Church representatives, Anglesey Council, Estyn, Welsh Ministers, relevant Assembly Members and Members of Parliament etc.

If the Cabinet decides to proceed following consideration of the consultation report, the proposal will have to be issued in the form of a statutory notice. The notice will be published on a school day and there will be an "objection period" of 28 days from the date when the proposal is published. Anyone can object to the proposal. The notice will be posted on the Gwynedd Council website and also close to the main reception in all schools involved in the proposal; copies will be sent to the schools to be distributed to pupils, parents,

carers and guardians, staff and governors. Hard copies will be available on request to the modernising education office.

After the objection period closes, the Council will publish a summary of the statutory objections and the Council's response to the objections in an "objection report". The objection report will be posted on the Council's website and hard copies will be available on request. Parents, carers and guardians, staff and governors of all schools in the catchment area will also be informed that the objection report is available. A number of representatives from other agencies will be informed that the objection report is available.

The Council's Cabinet will make the final decision on the objection report within 28 days of the end of the objection period. When the Cabinet has reached its final decision, the decision will be put in writing along with explicit reasons for the decision. The decision will be posted on the Council's website, and parents, carers and guardians, staff and governors of all schools in the catchment area will be informed of the decision. A number of representatives from other agencies will also be informed of the decision.

In some instances, after the Cabinet's final decision – it is possible for the following bodies to refer the proposal to Welsh Ministers for their consideration:

- Another local authority affected by the proposal
- Appropriate religious body for any school affected
- Governing body of a voluntary or foundation school which is the subject of the proposal
- Any trust which holds land on behalf of a voluntary or foundation school which is the subject of the proposal
- Further education establishment affected by the proposal

The bodies which refer the proposal need to note the reason why they are of the opinion that the decision reached by the Local Authority is incorrect. Welsh Ministers would then decide whether the proposal affect the bodies and whether they need to consider the proposals.
